## Hopkins County Juvenile Justice Data Sheet

Under SB 653, the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) has been made responsible for partnering with “local county governments, the courts, and communities to promote public safety,”<sup>1</sup> as well as for “producing positive outcomes for youth, families, and communities.”<sup>2</sup> To ensure these mandates are met, stakeholders must familiarize themselves with the information pertinent to their community.

Youth who reside in Delta, Franklin, and Rains Counties fall under the jurisdiction of the Hopkins County Juvenile Probation Department. The data and figures below reflect the number of youth who have entered the system from that jurisdiction.

### County Overview<sup>3</sup>

- **Youth Population (age 10 to 16):** 12,083
  - Delta:* 7,256
  - Franklin:* 820
  - Hopkins:* 3,153
  - Rains:* 854
- **Youth Referred to TJJD:**<sup>4</sup> 107
- **Youth Referred with Past Traumatic Experience:** 55 (51%)
- **Youth Referred with Diagnosed Mental Illness:** Fewer than 5
- **Youth Referred but Not Adjudicated:** 70
- **Youth Securely Detained Pre-Adjudication:**<sup>5</sup> 63
- **Average Days from Referral to Disposition:** 69
- **Youth Adjudicated to Probation:** 32
- **Youth Adjudicated to Secure Placement:**<sup>6</sup> Fewer than 5
- **Youth Committed to State Secure Facilities:** 4
- **Youth Certified as Adults:** 0

### Investment in Community Programming

Reducing the number of youth adjudicated to residential facilities can only be achieved if stakeholders strongly invest in “a consistent, county-based continuum of effective interventions, supports, and services.”<sup>7</sup> The programs delineated below are the current services within Hopkins County that can be utilized as alternatives to incarceration.

<sup>4</sup> A youth is formally referred to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department if face-to-face contact is made with a designated juvenile office for having engaged in delinquent activity within the Department's jurisdiction.

<sup>5</sup> A pre-adjudication detention center is a secure residential facility (public or private) used for temporary placement of youth who have been accused of committing an offense.

<sup>6</sup> A post-adjudication placement involves a secure residential facility (public or private) where youth are placed after disposition of their case.

<sup>8</sup> The Community Corrections Diversion Program (Grant C) is used by local juvenile probation departments to divert youth from a state secure facility commitment to community supervision. In 2011, 3,650 youth received Grant C-funded programming, placement, services, or specialized supervision; approximately 77% of those youth successfully completed supervision. Texas Juvenile Probation Commission, *Annual Report to the Governor and Legislative Budget Board*, December 2011.

<sup>9</sup> The Intensive Community-Based Program (Grant X) is used by local juvenile probation departments for "enhanced or additional community based programs and services for jailable misdemeanor and felony offenders." In 2011, 8,392 youth were served under Grant X funds; 81% of those youth received treatment via programming. Texas Juvenile Probation Commission, *Annual Report to the Governor and Legislative Budget Board*, December 2011.

<sup>10</sup> The Intensive Community-Based Pilot Program (Grant U) is used by local juvenile probation departments with populations over 335,000 to serve youth with chronic and serious offenses via community-based programming. In 2011, 839 youth across eight counties (Bexar, Cameron, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Harris, Tarrant, and Travis) were served by Grant U funding. Texas Juvenile Probation Commission, *Annual Report to the Governor and Legislative Budget Board*, December 2011.

<sup>11</sup> As of September 2011, these grants were consolidated under Grant A along with Grants F, H, Z, L, O, R, V, and Y.

<sup>13</sup> Hopkins County does not have a juvenile detention center (pre-adjudication facility) or secure residential placement facility (post-adjudication). Youth who are referred to TJJD from Hopkins County are primarily detained (pre-adjudication) in the Hunt County Juvenile Detention Center. Separately, post-adjudication placements of youth from Hopkins County vary by need and proximity to home (e.g., youth in need of sex offender treatment are placed in the Pegasus School).

<sup>14</sup> This number was obtained via TJJD's Facility Registry. This is the only cost made public; it reflects the per-youth expense that another county would pay to place their youth within this facility.

<sup>15</sup> Inappropriate use of solitary confinement (also known as disciplinary seclusions) and physical restraints (also known as use of force) in juvenile secure facilities create major barriers to successful rehabilitation. These concerns are especially serious for traumatized youth and youth with mental health issues. See, e.g., L.M. Finke "The Use of Seclusion is Not an Evidence-Based Practice" (2001), and G.R. Hodas "Responding to Childhood Trauma: The Promise and Practice of Trauma Informed Care" (2006).
