
Among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Harmon:

- 91% of Black defendants (180 out of 198)
- 82% of Hispanic White defendants (64 out of 78)
- 73% of non-Hispanic White defendants (92 out of 126)

Last week, among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Harmon, 91% of Black defendants (180 out of 198 on an average night), 82% of Hispanic White defendants (64 out of 78 on an average night), and 73% of non-Hispanic White defendants (92 out of 126 on an average night) were detained in Harris County Jail because they couldn't afford money bail.

Judge Harmon's racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Black and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 50% worst in Harris County. Her racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Hispanic and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 50% worst in Harris County.
