Among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Harmon:


- 77% of Black defendants (149 out of 194)
- 70% of Hispanic White defendants (46 out of 66)
- 56% of non-Hispanic White defendants (71 out of 128)

were detained per night based on inability to pay

Last week, among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Harmon, 77% of Black defendants (149 out of 194 on an average night), 70% of Hispanic White defendants (46 out of 66 on an average night), and 56% of non-Hispanic White defendants (71 out of 128 on an average night) were detained in Harris County Jail because they couldn't afford money bail.

Judge Harmon's racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Black and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 50% worst in Harris County. Her racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Hispanic and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 25% worst in Harris County.
